1. (24 points) For each of the following functions y, compute the derivative  $\frac{dy}{dx}$ .

(a) 
$$y = 2x^9 - 4\sqrt[5]{x^2} - \frac{4}{x^7} = 2x^9 - 4x^{2/5} - 4x^{-7}$$

$$\frac{dy}{dx} = 18x^8 - \frac{8}{5}x^{-3/5} + 28x^{-8}$$

(b) 
$$y = (\ln(x))^{x}$$
  $\longrightarrow$   $\ln y = \ln(\ln(x))^{x}$ 

$$= \chi \ln(\ln(x))$$

$$\frac{1}{y} \frac{dy}{dx} = 1 \cdot \ln(\ln(x)) + \chi \cdot \frac{1}{\ln(x)} \cdot \frac{1}{\chi}$$

$$\frac{dy}{dx} = y \left(\ln(\ln(x)) + \frac{1}{\ln(x)}\right)$$

$$= \left[\left(\ln(x)\right)^{\chi} \cdot \left(\ln(\ln(x)) + \frac{1}{\ln(x)}\right)\right]$$
(c)  $y = \cos(xe^{x})$ 

$$\frac{dy}{dx} = -\sin(\chi e^{x}) \cdot \left[1 \cdot e^{\chi} + \chi \cdot e^{\chi}\right]$$

$$= \left[-\sin(\chi e^{\chi}) \cdot \left(e^{\chi} + \chi e^{\chi}\right)\right]$$

(d) 
$$y = e^{(\sin(\sqrt{x}))}$$
  $\frac{dy}{dx} = \begin{bmatrix} e^{\sin(\sqrt{x})} & \cos(\sqrt{x}) & \frac{1}{2\sqrt{x}} \end{bmatrix}$ 

(e) 
$$y = \frac{2\tan(x)}{\ln(x) + e^x}$$
 
$$\frac{dy}{dx} = \frac{\left(\ln(x) + e^x\right) \cdot 2\sec^2(x) - 2\tan(x) \cdot \left(\frac{1}{x} + e^x\right)}{\left(\ln(x) + e^x\right)^2}$$

(f) 
$$y = \ln\left(\frac{(3x-3)^4 e^{2x}}{\sqrt[3]{2x+1}}\right) = \int \ln\left((3x-3)^4\right) + \ln\left(e^{2x}\right) - \ln\left((2x+1)^{\frac{1}{3}}\right)$$
  

$$= 4 \ln\left(3x-3\right) + 2x - \frac{1}{3} \ln\left(2x+1\right)$$

$$\frac{dy}{dx} = 4 \cdot \frac{1}{3x-3} \cdot 3 + 2 - \frac{1}{3} \cdot \frac{1}{2x+1} \cdot 2$$

$$= \frac{4}{x-1} + 2 - \frac{2}{3(2x+1)}$$

### 2. (18 points)

(a) Suppose that  $2y^2 + \sin(x) = xy - 8$ . Find  $\frac{dy}{dx}$ .

$$\frac{d}{dx} \left(2y^2 + 8in(x)\right) = \frac{d}{dx} \left(xy - 8\right)$$

$$4y \frac{dy}{dx} + \cos(x) = y + x \frac{dy}{dx}$$

$$4y \frac{dy}{dx} - x \frac{dy}{dx} = y - \cos(x)$$

$$\left(4y - x\right) \frac{dy}{dx} = y - \cos(x)$$

$$\frac{dy}{dx} = \frac{y - \cos(x)}{4y - x}$$

(b) Consider the curve defined by the equation  $x^3 + y^3 = 16$ . Find all points where the tangent line to the curve is parallel to the line x + y = 0.

$$\frac{d}{dx}(x^{3}+y^{3}) = \frac{d}{dx}(10)$$

$$3x^{2}+3y^{2}\frac{dy}{dx} = 0$$

$$\frac{dy}{dx} = \frac{-3x^{2}}{3y^{1}}$$

$$\frac{dy}{dx} = -\frac{x^{2}}{y^{2}}$$

The line x+y=0 has slope -1, so we want to know at which points on  $x^2+y^3=16$  the tangent line has slope -1:

$$\frac{dy}{dx} = -1 \implies -\frac{x^2}{y^2} = -1$$

$$\implies x^2 = y^2$$


$$\implies x = \pm y.$$

 If  $X=y$ , then  $X^3+y^3=10 \Rightarrow 2x^3=10 \Rightarrow X^3=8 \Rightarrow X=2, y=2$ 

$$\otimes$$
 If  $X=-y$ , then  $X^3+y^3=16 \Rightarrow X^3-X^3=16$   
 $\Rightarrow 0=16 \iff cannot happen!$ 



- 3. (18 points) A 2 ft long rod has one end at the origin. The other end is the point (x, y), which rotates counterclockwise in a circle around the origin. Assume that x is decreasing at a rate of 1 foot per minute when the angle between the rod and the positive x-axis is  $\pi/6$ . At that moment:
- (a) What is the rate of change of y in feet per minute?

4. (20 points) A ball is thrown vertically from the window of a tall building. Its height above the ground (in feet) at time t seconds is given by the function

$$x(t) = -16t^2 + 32t + 48: \ t \ge 0.$$

(a) On what interval(s) is the ball moving up?

The ball is moving up when velocity is positive:

$$v(t) = x'(t) = -32t + 32.$$

$$v(t) > 0 \iff -32t + 32 > 0$$

$$\iff 32 > 32t$$

$$\iff 1 > t$$

(b) When does the ball hit the ground?

$$x(t) = 0$$
  $\longrightarrow$   $-10t^{2} + 32t + 48 = 0$   
 $-10(t^{2} - 2t - 3) = 0$   
 $-10(t - 3)(t + 1) = 0$

(c) What is the acceleration of the ball as a function of time?

### 5. (20 points)

(a) A sample of radioactive material is placed in a room and begins decaying at a rate proportional to its mass. After 10 days, its mass equals  $\frac{1}{5}$  of its starting mass. How many days does it take for the mass to equal  $\frac{1}{10}$  of its starting mass?

let P(t) be the mass after t days.) Then P(t) = Poekt let Po be the initial mass. | for some constant k.

- $P(10) = \frac{1}{5}P_0$   $\Longrightarrow P_0 e^{k.10} = \frac{1}{5}P_0$   $\Longrightarrow e^{10k} = \frac{1}{5}$   $\Longrightarrow 10k = \ln(1/5)$  $\Longrightarrow k = \frac{1}{10}\ln(1/5)$ .
- $P(t) = \frac{1}{10}P_0$   $\Rightarrow P_0 e^{\frac{1}{10}\ln(1/5) \cdot t} = \frac{1}{10}P_0$   $\Rightarrow e^{\frac{1}{10}\ln(1/5) \cdot t} = \frac{1}{10}$   $\Rightarrow \frac{1}{10}\ln(1/5) \cdot t = \ln(1/10)$  $\Rightarrow t = \frac{10 \cdot \ln(1/10)}{\ln(1/5)}$  days

(b) Use the linearization of  $f(x) = \sqrt[3]{x}$  at x = 8 to approximate  $\sqrt[3]{8.2}$ .

Linearization: 
$$L(x) = f(8) + f'(8)(x-8)$$

$$f(x) = \sqrt[3]{x} = x^{1/3} \implies f'(x) = \frac{1}{3}x^{-2/3} = \frac{1}{3(\sqrt[3]{x})^2}$$

• 
$$f(8) = \sqrt[3]{8} = 2$$
.

$$f'(8) = \frac{1}{3(\sqrt[3]{8})^2} = \frac{1}{3 \cdot 2^2} = \frac{1}{12}$$

So 
$$L(x) = 2 + \frac{1}{12}(x-8)$$
